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Children's Film Festival Offers Media Guidance for Parents & Professionals

Rochester, NY, March 27, 2008 – The third annual Children's Film Festival, *Through the Eyes of a Child*, will again help Monroe County parents make appropriate viewing choices for their children with information from child development experts and free films during the month of April. The festival, coordinated by Children's Institute in collaboration with the Rochester High Falls International Film Festival, features free screenings of quality films at libraries, schools, child care centers, and Rochester Museum & Science Center, and special programs at the Dryden Theatre at George Eastman House International Museum of Photography and Film.

The festival kicks off with a panel of experts on April 1, 6:30 p.m. at Cornell Cooperative Extension, 249 Highland Avenue in Rochester. Three child development experts will address child care providers and educators on helping parents make good viewing choices for their children. "Parents' understanding of what their children are experiencing during and after watching television and films is as important as selecting and limiting the shows they see," said Dr. Stephen Munson, noted local child psychiatrist and panel member. This balance between understanding and limit setting will be among the topics covered in the panel discussion.

Throughout the month of April, the Children's Film Festival brings "films to familiar neighborhood settings, such as schools and libraries, that are within walking distance of where families live," said Ruth Cowing, Festival Director and Co-Programmer of the Rochester High Falls International Film Festival, adding that "films to be shown this year include shorts from around the world: from Ethiopia, France, Germany, Australia and Ireland." Parents who attend screenings will receive information about choosing entertainment for children, with suggested questions to help promote conversations with their children about the films' content. Libraries will also have DVDs of the traveling show, which can be signed out with a library card.

In its third year, the Children's Film Festival continues to be a growing collaborative effort of organizations and funding partners, said primary festival organizer Connie Valk of Children's Institute. The collaborative continues to create awareness of the violence children experience



in the media and helps parents and caregivers choose child-safe programming. Outreach efforts this year include information for pediatricians and a segment on 292-BABY's Parent Talk program on Cable Station 4. The Festival is also a focal point of this year's Month of the Young Child, a celebration of children sponsored by the Rochester Association for the Education of Young Children (RAEYC).

The Children's Film Festival is supported by the Dr. and Mrs. James W. Sayre Fund at The Community Foundation, Target Stores, RAEYC, Child Care Council, RCN Family Child Care Satellites of Greater Rochester, Monroe County Library System, the Early Childhood Education Quality Council, the Hunter Institute for Young Children, Rochester Museum & Science Center, Children's Institute and the Rochester High Falls International Film Festival.
